President's Message | Від Голови

Дорогі члени Української громади! Dear Ukrainian community members!

Мені випала велика честь, як Голові Конґресу українців Канади – Провінційноі ради Альберти працювати минулого року з нашою громадою під час складних умов, таких як пандемія. Проте нам вдалося подолати ці випробування та ми всі мали надію, що після закінчення пандемії ми повернемося до нормального життя. Але на жаль, 24 лютого Росія розпочала масовані атаки на Україну і наша робота перейшла в нове русло, щоби підтримувати Україну та українських переселенців у нашій провінції.

This year marks 130 years of Ukrainian settlement in Alberta, but it also marks a tragic period in the history of our Ukrainian homeland with the barbaric Russian invasion of Ukraine. Once again, Ukrainians around the world are confronting the horrible reality that brutal and immoral Russian invaders are attempting to eliminate Ukrainian nationhood, history, language, and culture. Nevertheless, Ukrainians remain strong, proud, and unwavering, and we pay tribute to those whose bravery and valor make it possible to safeguard Ukraine's independence today.

This past year while maintaining our regular programs, we have aligned our work to help support settlement of Ukrainians in Alberta and provide Ukraine with humanitarian aid. In order to manage the crisis that the war has brought, the UCC-APC office has hosted several welcome events to help Ukrainian newcomers. We have also supported English classes in both Edmonton and Calgary, and distributed TELUS SIM cards, clothing, laptops, school backpacks and \$35,000 in grocery gift cards to support Ukrainian newcomers in Alberta. Additionally, we have hosted job fairs in-person and online, and provided emergency housing and food to those in need. Our Ukrainian Newcomer Furniture Warehouse has helped approximately 75 newcomer families per week furnish their new homes with mattresses, kitchen tables & chairs, sofas, and dressers. This year we have also redesigned our uccab.ca website which includes a special section for Ukrainian Newcomers. This bilingual website includes new and up-to-date information for settlement in Alberta for both Ukrainians and host families to use. We are proud to have distributed over \$200,000 in grant money to help support existing Ukrainian organizations in Alberta with programming and membership for newcomers.

Despite the challenges instigated by the war, we moved forward with hosting our annual events this year. Our Ukrainian Day celebration was a huge success and an important showcase of Ukrainian culture and talent in the face of Russian aggression. This event commemorated the 130th anniversary of Ukrainian settlement in Alberta and we are grateful to our partner organization Baba's and Borshch for their collaboration in the success of this event. We also coordinated our annual Holodomor Memorial Day and National Internment Commemoration Day.

I am so proud of how resilient our community has been through COVID and in response to this heinous war against Ukraine. I would like to thank all the staff, hundreds of volunteers, donors and sponsors who have come together this past year to help support our Ukrainian community and keep it strong and vibrant.

UCC-APC 2021-2022 Annual Report

As the year 2021 was coming to an end, so were the COVID restrictions and our lives began opening with minimal to no government restrictions. We were excited and gearing up to celebrate in person 130 years of Ukrainians being in Canada. As planning for this big milestone celebration began, Russia invaded Ukraine on February 24th, 2022, and everyone's lives changed. Our work has significantly shifted to support the crisis in Ukraine. Having said that, we are grateful to announce that we did celebrate Ukrainian Day 2022 with our theme "130th Anniversary of Ukrainians in Alberta" on August 27-28th, 2022.

As of October 26th, Alberta has welcomed more than **14,000** Ukrainian newcomers fleeing the war. Approximately 42% arrived and settled in Calgary and 32% to Edmonton; the remaining newcomers have dispersed across Alberta.

To respond to the extraordinary circumstances of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, our priorities aligned to the following areas: community outreach, settlement supports for Ukrainian newcomers, funding for our Ukrainian community organizations, humanitarian aid to Ukraine, Ukrainian Day, and Interment Commemoration.

1. Community Outreach

When the war broke out, UCC-APC began engaging and meeting with agencies such as Catholic Social Services, Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers, Action for Healthy Communities, and Bredin Centre for Career Advancement. We attend provincial multi-stakeholder meetings with government representatives on a regular basis to address settlement support gaps. UCC-APC is represented at Northern and Southern agency meetings that are held every two weeks, and we attend biweekly UCC National working groups sharing best practices and addressing newcomer gaps.

UCC-APC has played a significant role in advocating on settlement issues with all levels of government – municipal, provincial, and federal – and became the voice of the needs of newcomers. We met with Minister of Labour and Immigration Kaycee Madu and were influential in advocating for CUEAT newcomers to be included in the Alberta Advantage Immigration Program. We held meetings with MP Heather McPherson, Federal Minister of Tourism Randy Boissonnault, MP Ziad Aboultaif, Premier Jason Kenney, MLA Jackie Armstrong-Homeniuk, and many other government representatives, and raised important issues around housing and healthcare to help close the gaps relating to Ukrainian newcomers in Alberta.

We played a significant role in addressing important issues with the media during the crisis. UCC-APC held over 50 interviews with various media stations including CBC, ITV, City New, BBC.

When the war broke out, several new community organizations established across the province to provide support to Ukraine and

to Alberta Ukrainian newcomers. UCC-APC quickly engaged and connected with the communities to help support these new organizations in places such as Fort McMurray, Lethbridge, Red Deer, Vegreville and Bonneyville. UCC-APC held meetings and provided support such as \$100 TELUS SIM cards, laptops, clothing donations from Joe Fresh clothing, and gift cards.

UCC-APC played the key role in coordinating with Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) to fill the first plane with displaced Ukrainians coming from Poland to Edmonton. We partnered with former Premier Ed Stelmach, former MLA Thomas Lukaszuk, the Canadian Polish Historical Society, and LOT Polish Airlines who donated a plane.



2. Settlement Supports for Ukrainian Newcomers – Humanitarian Aid

We established the website **uccab.ca** to support newcomers with resources that aid in settlement. The website is regularly maintained, providing credible, up-to-date information for settlement of Ukrainian newcomers coming to Alberta.



In Edmonton, an airport "Welcome Booth" was established to greet Ukrainian Newcomers and was run by President of the Ukrainian National Federation Ivan Lypovyk, very soon after the war broke out and operated until the end of June. In July, the Calgary Catholic Immigration Services established a "Welcome Booth" at the Calgary airport to greet and support Ukrainian newcomers.

UCC-APC has also been involved in providing emergency housing and food for those newcomers in crisis.

UCC-APC has been playing a role in supporting English classes as Alberta has a significant wait time to access English classes. Calgary has offered intensive 2-week English classes to help support newcomers, and Edmonton has been hosting weekly English classes to help support the language learning gap. MacEwan University also offered Ukrainian classes for newcomers during the spring and summer time. In addition, UCC-APC has formed an educational committee to create a central educational resource portal for teachers, to help support them with English as a second language material.

We are supporting and coordinating employment opportunities through online job fairs and in-person job fairs. Calgary held a job fair in person on October 14th where 700 people and 28 employers attended. Edmonton hosted an in-person job fair on November 4th. We partnered with various agencies such as Bredin Institute, Catholic Social Services, and the Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers to support



the employment needs of newcomers. Over 200 newcomers attended, and 15 different employers participated in the event.

Furniture warehouses have been established in both Calgary and Edmonton to help newcomers settle into their new homes with mattresses, kitchen tables & chairs, couches, dressers, and other furniture items. Thousands of newcomers in Alberta have had their homes completely furnished by furniture donations at the warehouses. Free clothing pop-up stores have also emerged to help support newcomers, and numerous churches and other organizations have taken on the role to help support newcomers with clothing and furniture.

Working together with community members, we began the **Ukrainian Newcomer Furniture Warehouse** in Edmonton to help newcomers with their basic needs, providing free furniture to any Ukrainians fleeing the war. The 23,000 square-foot warehouse was generously donated by the International Brotherhood of Boilermaker's Lodge 146, and depends on the generosity of volunteers and donated furniture. Since its inception in April 2022 with volunteer coordinator Lev Rinhel, the Ukrainian Newcomer Furniture Warehouse has helped to furnish the homes of approximately **75 families per week** (~300 families per month). The Honourable Chrystia Freeland, Deputy Prime Minister of Canada, had the unique opportunity to visit the Ukrainian Newcomer Furniture Warehouse in October (*top left*).



UCC-APC has hosted 4 welcome events in Edmonton for Ukrainian newcomers. The events provided important information to help with settlement – topics covered included employment opportunities, English classes, banking information, school programs, etc. These events provided an opportunity to connect newcomers with various resources and meet other newcomers in the city.




Calgary Ukrainian Evacuee Welcome Committee

In March of 2022, the Ukrainian Welcome Center opened its doors to Ukrainian evacuees at St.Vladimir's Ukrainian Orthodox Sobor. From that time, over 5,000 Ukrainian evacuees have been served at the center. The Calgary Ukrainian Evacuee Welcome Committee invited Calgary settlement agencies to the center to provide timely and efficient help for evacuees that were trying to figure out their way in a new country with minimal support from government. The Committee was joined by multiple community members from the very first days of its existence, including The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, St. Stephen Protomatyr Ukrainian Catholic Church, Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Ukrainian Catholic Church, Rotary Club of Calgary North, UCPBA, and UCC Calgary.

The activity of the Committee focuses on key areas: onboarding and after arrival support (information and arrival packages), housing, English language, and employability. So far, the Committee has organized two job fairs attended by over 1,200 employment seekers and 60 employers, with another job fair planned for January 27, 2023. The Committee also worked with multiple employers to provide as many employment opportunities to Ukrainian evacuees as possible, which were communicated to the people that attended the Ukrainian Welcome Center and on social media.

From the very first job fair it was clear that the main culprit for Ukrainian evacuees having difficulty getting jobs was lack of English language knowledge. It was taking excessive time for Ukrainian evacuees to get to government sponsored English language courses, so the Committee started bridging that gap by organizing volunteer-led English language courses. Approximately 60 people benefited from these courses, but progress was slower than desirable.

In July 2022 with the help of multiple donors, the Committee commenced "Survival English" courses developed and taught by professional teachers that were evacuees from Ukraine themselves. Since its start, nearly 600 people have graduated from this program. 60% of those students were able to get a job after the course and 80% of those who found a job claim that the course helped them to find it. In addition, the Committee and its members organize numerous information sessions for Ukrainian evacuees in areas of employment, settlement, school system and mental health. Members of the Committee, St. Stephen Protomartyr Ukrainian Catholic Church and Rotary Club North administer programs for rental support for Ukrainian evacuees and provide them with financial support. The Committee will continue to work in the indicated areas going forward.





3. Financial Support for our Ukrainian Community in Alberta

UCC-APC was very fortunate to have been able to disperse funds to help support our organizations and Ukrainian newcomers.

- 1) \$150,000 was dispersed to Ukrainian organizations to help support Ukrainians settling in Alberta
- 2) \$60,000 was dispersed to various organizations to help support summer camp fees, Ukrainian organizations newcomer membership fees, pay for Ukrainian Classes, etc.
- 3) \$35,000 was dispersed in food gift cards to newcomers

The **Grant to Support Alberta's Ukrainian Organizations** provides funds to Ukrainian registered societies or charitable organizations in Alberta belonging to the UCC-APC and their sister organizations, to support Ukrainian nationals fleeing the war in Ukraine and settling in Alberta. This grant funding covers the costs for various projects that Ukrainian organizations would like to offer in Alberta and can assist organizations to complement but not duplicate existing government programs and services. Projects may include hosting newcomers' events in Alberta, coordinating and supporting activities that are not being conducted by agencies (e.g., job fairs), bridging newcomer gaps and aiding navigation to online services and directing them to appropriate areas and agencies.

The **Settlement Support Grant for the Ukrainian Community** provides funding to Canadian-Ukrainian organizations and affiliated organizations that fall under the umbrella of the UCC-APC, to support Ukrainian nationals fleeing the war in Ukraine and settling in Alberta. The funding covers the costs for various engagement projects that Ukrainian organizations would like to offer to assist individuals and families in Alberta. This may include supporting Ukrainian Nationals by paying Ukrainian organizational membership fees, paying registration fees for children's day camps in Alberta (for newly arrived Ukrainians fleeing the war), funding field trips for Ukrainian newcomers to places of interest in Alberta that support Ukrainian culture, reimbursing participant fees for Ukrainian cultural activities in Alberta or family camps to enrich the Ukrainian language and culture (for newly arrived Ukrainians fleeing the war), or hosting newcomer welcome and information events.

UCC-APC was also grateful to receive \$350,000 in grant funding from the Government of Alberta on February 23rd, 2022, to help us operationalize and support Ukraine.

4. Humanitarian Aid for Ukraine

UCC-APC played a role in filling the 1st plane to Ukraine with emergency response equipment. We partnered with Firefighter Aid Ukraine and filled a plane with donations in less than 12 hours.

Our second project to support Ukraine was a donation of \$10,000 to our Ukraine twinning city partner Ivano-Frankivsk. We collaborated with Svitlana Onyshchuk (*right*), Head of the Ivano-Frankivsk Regional State Administration. The money was used to purchase laboratory equipment for the military hospital.

UCC-APC also sent 12 iPads to Ukraine to support the army.





Maria Burmaka Fundraising Concert



In October 2022, we hosted a benefit concert featuring popular Ukrainian singer, Maria Burmaka. The concert raised funds for the charitable fund "KOLO," which distributes humanitarian aid and medical supplies to Ukrainians affected by the war. Over 100 people were in attendance, raising over \$2000 for this worthy cause.

During Maria's stay in Edmonton, she also had a chance to share Ukrainian music with students, including at St. Martin Elementary School, St. Matthew Elementary School, Archishop Jordan High School, and Ridna Shkola. Maria also performed at the 90th anniversary of the Ukrainian National Federation and Ukrainian Women's Organization of Canada, Edmonton Society.

We thank Maria Burmaka for visiting our Ukrainian community in Edmonton, as well as all attendees of the concert. Special thanks to the concert organizers and our UCC-APC director Liliya Sokha for leading this fundraising initiative.





5. Fundraising Campaign

In June 2022, UCC-APC held a successful "Golf Tournament." The tournament had many sponsors and over 70 participants. We raised over \$20,000 for Canada Ukraine Foundation to help support settlement in Alberta. Thank you to Alex Taraiev, our UCC-APC director who led this fundraising initiative.

UCC-APC is very grateful to the Government of Alberta who has supported the Ukrainian Crisis with \$23 million in the past 9 months. Moving forward we will continue to fundraise and provide humanitarian aid to support the settlement of Ukrainian Newcomers in Alberta. We will continue to adjust as we stabilize in a new normal.



Alberta Supports Ukraine Highlights



There are over 375,000 people that identify as Ukrainian in Alberta. This number will continue to grow as Ukrainian nationals fleeing war arrive in Alberta. Albertans have opened their homes and hearts to support more than 14,000 Ukrainians who have resettled in our province. UCC-APC is working tirelessly to help displaced Ukrainians find housing, provide necessities and advocate for their needs in Alberta.

Here are a few ways that UCC-APC and its partners have been standing with Ukraine:

6. Ukrainian Day

On August 28, 2022, Ukrainian Day returned to its roots with celebrations in the town of Lamont, in partnership with the "Babas and Borshch Ukrainian Festival," to commemorate the 130th anniversary of the first settlement of immigrants from western Ukraine to Alberta. The town of Lamont is located just north of Elk Island National Park, the original location of Ukrainian Day Celebrations over 80 years ago. Lamont is also just south of Star, where the first Ukrainians settled in Canada to establish what was



known as the Edna colony. While the 2022 events were unfortunately reminiscent of the 1940's Ukrainian Day Celebrations, which included newly-arrived individuals from war-torn Ukraine, the event was a success and consisted of many fulfilling moments for Ukrainian-Canadians, both old generations and new.

Throughout the festival weekend, events included honouring our descendants with a visit from Lieutenant Governor of Alberta Salma Lakhani, live demonstrations (e.g. Pysanka making, Ukrainian dance lessons), live music, Ukrainian souvenirs, art and history displays, a kids' zone, and Ukrainian food including free borshch samples and signature Ukrainian drinks.

The event was a huge success and would not have been possible without the tireless work of our team and extensive network of volunteers. The UCC-APC wishes to extend its thanks to the Organizing Committee for the Festival & Ukrainian Day 2022: Hazel Anaka, Lydia Migus and Rodomir Bilash.

7. Internment

National Internment Commemoration Week took place from October 22 – 30th, 2022, with National Internment Commemoration Day on October 28th, 2022. Under the acting authority of the War Measures Act between 1914 and 1920, 8,579 of Ukrainians were considered "enemy aliens" by Canada and unjustly imprisoned in concentration camps. During National Internment Commemoration Week, we remember the thousands of Ukrainians that were unjustly interned and suffered in Canada.

UCC-APC reached out to community organizations, schools, churches, and the province at large to raise awareness about these tragic events. Many people are unaware of the wrongful treatment of Ukrainian settlers in Canada, and this sad part of history is often forgotten. The UCC-APC called the province to be the voice for those who did not have the chance to speak up for themselves, advocating for school lessons about the internment, memorial masses at churches, and promoting the week on our website and social media.

On Saturday, October 29th, Ridna Shkola Ukrainian Heritage Language School of Edmonton commemorated Canada's First National Internment Operations.





8. XXVII Triennial Congress of Ukrainian Canadians – Трирічний Конґрес Українських Канадців



UCC-APC participated in the historic XXVII Triennial Congress of Ukrainian Canadians which took place from October 28-30, 2022, in Winnipeg, MB. There were over 400 Ukrainian community leaders in attendance from all over Canada. The delegates set the priorities and elected the leadership of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress for the next three years.

We were proud to have over 60 delegates from Alberta (*right*) dedicated to shaping the

present and future direction of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress. The theme of the Congress this year was – Stronger Together – В Єдності Сила – Tous ensemble – which allowed us to discuss the future of Ukraine and the future of our community amongst Canadian and Ukrainian government officials.



Конґрес Українців Канади- Едмонтонський Відділ Ukrainian Canadian Congress – Edmonton Branch

Слава Україні!

First off, I'd like to extend a huge "Thank you" to the volunteers of UCC Edmonton board. The last eight months have been challenging for everyone in our community.

There are a few items that are worth highlighting:

- UCC-Edmonton organized rallies in support of Ukraine leading up to the invasion including the well-attended Car rally on February 6, 2022. Following the full-scale invasion on February 24, 2022, UCC Edmonton co-organized and participated in numerous demonstrations beginning the first night of the war in front of the Legislature.
- 2) UCC-Edmonton fielded countless media inquiries related to the Russian Invasion. UCC-Edmonton has been vocal in speaking out against the spate of harassment, intimidation, and violence against the Ukrainian Community since the outbreak of the war.
- 3) In March, UCC-Edmonton worked with UCC-APC to facilitate the arrival of the first plane load of Ukrainians displace by the invasion.
- 4) UCC-Edmonton helped spearhead the NHL Alberta Stands with Ukraine week which included 4 Ukrainian themed game nights. The Oilers and Flames 50/50 draws raised hundreds of thousands for the UCC-CUF Humanitarian Appeal.
- 5) On June 16 We co-hosted Zeleni Sviata with LUC Edmonton including panakhyda at St. Michael's and Meet and greet with Viktor "Sig" a Canadian Volunteer fighting in Ukraine.
- 6) This year's Heritage Festival was a great success. Once again, an army of volunteers made this event possible. UCC-Edmonton spearheaded calls to ban the Russia Pavilion from the event. With support from UCC-APC as well as our member organizations we were successful.
- 7) On August 21, 2022, UCC-Edmonton hosted Ukrainian Independence Day at the Ukrainian Youth Unity Complex, the first time since 2017. This event was a smash hit with over 600 people in attendance. We partnered with YEG4Ukraine and donated over \$5000 to their ambulance project. The performers were almost exclusively Newcomers. Special thank-you to Olena Danyleiko for putting together a spectacular artistic program on short notice after our original plans fell through.
- 8) UCC-Edmonton sent 7 Delegates to the XXVII Triennial Congress of Ukrainian Canadians in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Five other board members attended as delegates from member organizations.
- 9) We are in the midst of planning this year's Holodomor Commemoration which will feature keynote speaker Michael Bociurkiw. Michael is an Edmonton born, Ukraine based Journalist with excellent insights into the Russia's use of food as weapon both in 1932-33 and today




Highlights of programming we offered and events we hosted this year include:

- 4. - 5. Last year, our organization successfully hosted AFUES Casino. Thank you to many of AFUES members and supporters for donating their time and expertise to run this successful fundraising event. Special thank you to Olena Hartsula for coordinating volunteers for this casino.

AFUES also closely cooperates with other Ukrainian Educational organizations to create a new multimedia resource for learning of the Ukrainian language outside of Ukraine. As you know, AFUES has commissioned a special Needs Assessment of the Ukrainian language readers and textbooks in Canada. The outcome of this research demonstrated a definite need for Ukrainian language textbooks not just in Canada, but also in the Ukrainian diaspora around the world. AFUES has initiated negotiations with the UCC National Ukrainian Language Education Council and also Ukrainian World Congress Ukrainian Education Council, who are interested in co-financing the development of such Ukrainian readers and textbooks.

The Alberta Ukrainian Dance Association (AUDA) exists to serve the needs of the Ukrainian dance community as a liaison, network hub, and information resource center. Our mandate, which is determined through feedback from our membership and regular stakeholder engagements, includes the following:

- To promote, maintain, and enhance the appreciation of Ukrainian culture through dance.
- To serve as a liaison in the Ukrainian dance community and respond to requests for assistance from dance groups and instructors.
- To enable skill development and improvement opportunities through conferences and workshops.
- To collect and distribute information on the various aspects of Ukrainian dance in a wider context of performing arts
- To encourage participation in dance as a multifaceted lived experience in physical, artistic, and social settings for people of all ages and from all walks of life
- To facilitate participation in performance events and festivals as way of promoting cross-cultural competence and modeling behaviour of diversity and inclusion

AUDA continues to support over 60 schools across the province where nearly 3,500 children, teens and adults participate in Ukrainian dance enriching the cultural life of our communities. There are also over 80 instructors from the Edmonton area who teach in Edmonton and across the province.

Our Board of Directors maintains a healthy ratio of male to female members who boast a variety of skills and talents be it in teaching dance, creating artistic events, mentorship, or communication, research and administration.

We are always looking for new people to join our Board who will bring fresh perspectives to and engage in AUDA's activities.

In the past year, AUDA focused its efforts on enhancing member experience accessing digital resources housed on our website <u>https://www.abuda.ca/</u> with the most popular feature being an inventory of "dance-ready" music pieces commissioned by AUDA and representing various regions of Ukraine. In addition to increased interest in Alberta, this specific resource has attracted membership from other provinces in Canada, the USA, and internationally. We are proud to share that with one-third of our membership teaching and using AUDA's resources outside of the province of Alberta, we are truly transcending geographical borders.



Our second most important area of focus has been providing skill development opportunities to Ukrainian dance instructors. Yearly, AUDA organizes instructor development workshops taking place in Edmonton or Calgary. Last year's workshop took place in Edmonton and focused on skill-building and teaching techniques to children of various age groups. The workshop was specifically useful in the context of consequences imposed on us by Covid-19 environment and highlighted the importance of re-introducing children's physical engagement with dance as a step-by-step process.

AUDA's third area of contribution to the enjoyment of Ukrainian dance by wider communities was the participation in the UFest event in Edmonton in the spring of 2022. By volunteering their skill and knowledge, AUDA's Board organized a performance of two dances – Pryvit and Hopak – to show on stage to a delighted audience of UFest visitors.

With the upcoming 40th-year anniversary of its existence, AUDA is looking forward to staying true to its mandate, widening its reach of programming, and attracting new members and fresh ideas to make the experience of Ukrainian dance not only more colourful and vibrant, but also broadly accessible by all who would like to be part of it.

Since October 2021, we have had three Executive-Board meetings (both in-person and Zoom). The Alberta Branch of the UCBC held their in-person 40th Bi-annual Convention (Sept. 9-10, 2022) at Chateau Louis Conference Centre. The 27th Triennial Congress of the UCBC National was held in Edmonton at St. Basils Cultural Centre (Sept. 3 - Oct. 2, 2022).

The Alberta Branch of the Ukrainian Catholic Brotherhood of Canada has continued its work in sustaining financial assistance to our Ukrainian organizations. Since our last bi-annual convention in October 2019 to date, the Alberta Branch of the UCBC has financially assisted Ukrainian organizations to the amount of just over \$130,000. In 2022, we have assisted in projects related to "Stand with Ukraine" in the amount of \$10,000 (CUF-Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal, shipping costs for packages with required supplies to Ukraine, No Youth Left Behind Project sponsored by the Canadian Society of Ukrainians from Former Yugoslavia (CSUFY), and St. Josaphat's Sadochok - funding support for spaces for children from Ukraine). Some of the organizations that we have provided funding to is the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Edmonton, Ridna Shkola, Ivan Franko School of Ukrainian Studies, UCC-APC, UCC National, Sisters Servant Mary Immaculate (Edmonton and Mundare), Friends of Camp St. Basil Society, Ukrainian Performing Arts Society (UPAS), St. Mary's Ukrainian Catholic Church Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Chipman, AB), St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church (St. Michael, AB) and the Ukrainian Canadian Social Services (Edmonton).

Ukrainian Resource and Development Centre (UCRD)



Since the beginning of the Russian genocidal war, the Ukrainian Resource and Development Centre (URDC) at MacEwan University became a hub for students, faculty, and staff to provide information, develop resources and keep the University community engaged and focused on Ukraine.

For 35 years, URDC has developed and carried out provincial, national and international educational and community projects, connecting Canadian and Ukrainian academics and practitioners. URDC lead and supported numerous initiatives, including weekly

campus forums, work with various stakeholders, development of resources, joint online course developments and research studies with Ukrainian partners. As part of the Canada Ukraine Model United Nations project, URDC supported the Ukraine team to participate in the world largest Model UN simulation in New York, bringing the Voice of Ukrainian Resilience to the 4,000-student conference. MacEwan is sponsoring students from partner universities by having their tuition and accommodation covered. URDC, thanks to generous donation from the Ukrainian Foundation for College Education, offered financial bursaries to 20 students from Ukraine. In October, URDC hosted a Visiting Scholar from the National University of Kyiv Mohyla Academy.

URDC brought MacEwan and community educational experts to offer free English classes, when the urgency was identified. When laptops were needed, MacEwan university donated 45+ computers to the Ukrainian Canadian Social Services. When lack of information resources for newcomers became apparent, URDC provided support to UCC-APC to develop a website, as well as and developed the Ukrainian English Language Guide.

Now when the world shows signs of Ukraine fatigue, URDC's mission is to keep attention on the war and the human suffering inflicted on the Ukrainian people. Cultural and art events, such as *Be Brave Like Ukraine* poster exhibit and *Give Me Tomorrow* video art installation, a Ukrainian cooking show and *Food and Identity* talk aim to engage MacEwan and the wider community. Flying the Ukrainian flag at MacEwan and the Walk to the Legislature on September 7 was an act of solidarity with Ukraine and URDC's way of celebration of the Ukrainian Canadian Heritage Day.

MacEwan's Faculty of Fine Arts and Communications donated over \$10,000 in support of humanitarian aid for Ukraine. URDC marked its 35th anniversary with a special announcement of the launch of the *Gene Zwozdesky Artist in Residence Program* at MacEwan, as well as the Ukraine fundraising concert by John Stetch. It is about WHAT and HOW we work, with dignity, respect and humility. It is never a one-person job. It is always a team of passionate caring individuals that makes incredible things happen.

Highlights of UWAC-APE

Due to the restrictions of the Covid-19 Pandemic, the UWAC-APE has been largely inactive since 2019 but even so, did financially support the UOCC Western Eparchy, University of Alberta for Ukrainian Language Scholarships, UCC-APC for retrieval of UCAMA archives and the Ukrainian Museum of Canada. The Executive remains the same. Active branches currently include Calgary, Calmar, Edmonton (five branches), Lac La Biche, Smoky Lake and Two Hills.

While many on-going annual events were cancelled due to provincial health protocols during the pandemic, the Alberta branches under our umbrella are active once again and have reported the following activities: financial support to the Canada Ukraine Foundation, the Orthodox Church of Ukraine, UOC Western Eparchy, UCC-APC, as well as donations of clothing, furniture, temporary housing, gift cards, and travel vouchers to incoming Ukrainian families to Alberta including Ukrainian Orthodox camp registration fees to the children.

We extend our wishes for good health and safety to all members of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress – Alberta Provincial Council.
