Over 120 years ago, the first Ukrainian settlers arrived in Canada in search of a better life for their families, and a peaceful prosperous future for their children. Their hopes and dreams were realized through unimaginable hard work and determination. And in the process, the settlers became a founding nation in building the Canada we enjoy today - peaceful, prosperous and the envy of so many other countries around the world.

In our efforts to continue the dedication and hard work our pioneers exemplified over the past 120 years, the UCC-APC maintained a busy and gratifying year, complete with important and memorable events in our Alberta Ukrainian community. Our focus was on organizing and co-hosting the National UCC XXIII Congress of Ukrainian Canadians and commemorating the 120th anniversary of Ukrainian settlement in Canada. We also worked with the Ukrainian community in our province in several other key areas, such as providing support for the Ukrainian bilingual education programs, raising awareness about the Holodomor-Genocide of 1932-33 in Ukraine, and engaging youth in the organized Ukrainian community under the UCC-APC umbrella.

The following provides an overview of the UCC-APC activities over the past year and outlines the priorities for 2011-12.



Community Outreach and Development

Expanding our work across the province, and networking with our community organizations in Alberta continues to be a priority and is our foundation. We are building on progress to continually raise awareness about UCC and community initiatives in the province. Over the past year, our Community Development work has included:

Community Outreach: 2010-2011 provided several opportunities for UCC APC to work and partner with several organizations around Alberta. In addition to our support and work with local UCC branches, the UCC-APC President also met with Ukrainian community representatives in Grande Prairie to begin engaging the community in Northern Alberta in our broader Ukrainian network.

Hetman Awards: The annual Hetman Awards Gala was held on October 4, 2010 at St. John's Cultural Centre. At this event Premier Ed Stelmach and UCC-APC President Daria Luciw presented recognition Awards to honour outstanding volunteers in our community: Oksana Dacko, Mila Luchak, Ksenia Fedyna, Katrina Baziuk, Jaroslaw Szewczuk, Dobr. Nadia Kryschuk, Eugene Topolnisky, Andrew Ilnycky, Peter Dziedzic, Taras Uzwyshyn (posthumous). Along with the Premier, in attendance were Mayor

Stephen Mandel and Minister Gene Zwozdesky, along with many other dignitaries representing the federal and provincial governments. Dana Muryнка and Yuri Broda served as MC's, while entertainment was provided by the Viter Choir, Ukrainian Shumka Dancers and the Ukrainian Male Chorus of Edmonton.

Ukrainian Day: The 2011 Annual UCC APC Ukrainian Day Festival presented in conjunction with the Ukrainian Cultural Heritage Village, the Friends of the Ukrainian Village Society and the Alberta Council for Ukrainian Arts, celebrated our rich Ukrainian culture and commemorated the 120th anniversary of Ukrainian settlement in Canada. We had the privilege of hosting over 3,000 attendees at this event which comprised of a full day of activities for every generation. From the pancake breakfast and church services, to the children's craft tent and Kozak games, it was a wonderful day of celebration and paying tribute to our pioneers. The day also included the unveiling and blessing of name plaques at the Centenary Monument and a centenary pioneer recognition certificate presentation ceremony as a tribute to all pioneer families. A special commemorative ceremony at Canada's First Internment Operation Monument, the only internment camp monument in Northern Alberta, honoured thousands of Ukrainians and other Europeans. During these ceremonies, the Alberta Premier and UCC-APC President laid flowers at the Centenary Monument, the Royal Canadian Legion Monument and Canada's First Internment Operation Monuments.



This year's Luchkovich Award was presented to the Honourable Allen Sulatycky, a former Member of Parliament for Rocky Mountain from 1968-72. In 2004, Mr. Sulatycky was elected to sit as a Supernumerary Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench of Alberta. One of his most significant projects involving the Ukrainian Canadian community was the successful negotiation of a three-way agreement to establish the Ukrainian Cultural Heritage Village in Alberta.

The day also highlighted a grandstand concert, emceed by Roman Brytan, and which featured the Cheremosh Ukrainian Dance Ensemble, along with musical acts from around Alberta. We were also pleased to have in attendance many dignitaries including Premier Ed Stelmach, the first Alberta Premier of Ukrainian descent, along with MP's, MLA's and many mayors and reeves



from Alberta municipalities and towns.

UCC National: Alberta UCC continues to be an active participant on the National UCC Board of Directors, and a leader within our community in Canada. In particular, we actively supported the national awareness campaigns regarding the Canadian Museum for Human Rights (CMHR) in Winnipeg, Canada's First National Internment Operations, and the 120th anniversary of Ukrainian settlement in Canada. As issues and anniversaries such as these arise, it is important that we continue to engage our Alberta community as active and knowledgeable participants in these issues.

Congress XXIII: On November 8-10, UCC APC along with our community volunteers hosted a very successful Triennial Congress of Ukrainian Canadians - Congress XXIII, which featured three full days of networking, policy forums, exhibits and awards. This event was held for the first time in UCC's 70-year history in Alberta. UCC APC is proud to have organized this event, which had a positive impact on the overall development

of our community in Alberta. Delegates of the Congress elected the leadership of the Ukrainian Canadian community for the next 3 years, as well as marked the 70th Anniversary of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress and the 120 anniversary of Ukrainians in Canada. Featured speakers included Ambassadors Derek Fraser, Daniel Caron, Yuri Scherbak and Ihor Ostash, James Temerty, Dr. Volodymyr Viatrovych from Ukraine, Dr. Lubomyr Luciuk, Minister Gene Zwozdesky, and Dr. Olenka Bilash, among many others. Thought-provoking sessions, and a strong youth delegation resulted in a very successful event about which our community should be proud. Support and Sponsorship: The UCC-APC is proud to be an honorary patron of the Alberta-Ukraine Genealogical Project. This unique project provides families who are interested in learning about their past in Ukraine and Alberta with research support and avenues to learn more about their family history. The project also assists in re-uniting families where contact may have been disrupted during Soviet times. In 2011 we administered an Alberta Historical Research Foundation grant to support the Documentation of Church Properties

in Rural Communities in Alberta, a project undertaken by the society. The intent of this effort is to systematically record and photograph cemetery headstones and markers in rural cemeteries in order to preserve the historical information found within these church properties. UCC-APC also provided support for the commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the Chernobyl catastrophe, organized by the UCC-Edmonton Branch. In the same vein, the UCC-APC supported the 20th anniversary of Ukraine's Independence celebration, organized by the UCC-Edmonton Branch.

Ukrainian Bilingual Education Programs in Alberta: In May, UCC-APC called the community to form the Bilingual Education Committee to promote the Bilingual Program in Edmonton Public and Catholic schools, and the Elk Island School District (Sherwood Park). The committee chaired by UCC-APC President Daria Luciw developed a marketing plan to support and promote bilingual education. Several very important activities were already implemented and we look forward to working with community organizations, educators and students to both increase enrollment while providing more support and advocacy for the programs.

Fundraising for Community Projects: On Ukrainian Day 2011, President Daria Luciw was pleased to announce that UCC APC has undertaken a project to permanently relocate the original home of the Stelmach family to the Ukrainian Cultural Heritage Village. UCC-APC has committed to support the moving, foundation and restoration of this Stelmach home as part of the 120th anniversary of Ukrainian Settlement in Canada celebratory and commemorative activities by undertaking a fundraising drive and project management lead. To achieve this commitment, financial contributions from community are not only highly encouraged, but very much needed. With the community's support, visiting the Stelmach home and the Ukrainian Village will soon be a reality.

Government Relations

On March 22, 2011, after several preliminary meetings within our community, and led by the UCC-Alberta Provincial Council and President Daria Luciw, Edmonton area Ministers and MLAs met with ethnic community representatives including 45 members of our Ukrainian community, at Government House. The Honourable Dave Hancock initiated the meeting and several other

Ministers and other Edmonton area MLA's also took part. The purpose of this meeting was to receive input from the community about our vision for Edmonton in the 21st century. The Ukrainian community was very grateful for this opportunity to share our thoughts, vision and ideas on several issues of importance, including:

- (a) Awareness of the 120th and 125th anniversaries of Ukrainian settlement in Canada;
- (b) Canadian Museum of Human Rights - the need for a permanent and prominent Holodomor gallery;
- (c) Alberta Immigration Nominee Program - raised concerns about elements of the program which need to be addressed;
- (d) Canada-Ukraine Youth Mobility Program - future provincial participation in this program;
- (e) Ukrainian Cultural Heritage Village - the need to maintain authenticity and support for the original vision of this site;
- (f) Ukrainian Language and Cultural Education - the impact on our community and ideas for future development of a Community Language grant program;
- (g) Ukrainian Canadian Archives and Museum of Alberta - the positive impact of this project on Edmonton and ongoing funding concerns.

Our community presentations were well received and the ideas and actions requested of the Provincial Government by Ukrainian Albertans were both acknowledged and documented. Governmental officials in attendance have committed to follow-up on issues discussed. UCC APC will also continue to communicate with the government and move these issues forward.

Holodomor-Genocide 1932-33 Awareness



November 2010 marked the 2nd anniversary of the Ukrainian Famine and Genocide (Holodomor) Memorial Day Act in Alberta. Bill 37 Day - as sponsored by the Hon. Gen Zwozdesky - passed by the Alberta Legislature recognizes the Holodomor as genocide and sets aside the fourth Saturday of every November as Holodomor Memorial Day.

In attendance at the Legislature during the commemorative event on November 22, hosted by the Office of the Speaker, the Honourable Ken Kowalski, in cooperation with UCC-APC and League of Ukrainian Canadians, were Holodomor survivors, representatives of many Ukrainian organizations, students and other special guests.

During the commemoration Premier Ed Stelmach, Hon. Gene Zwozdesky, MLA Paul Hinman, President Daria Luciw, and survivor of

the Holodomor Leonid Korownyk, lit candles in memory of those died in the Ukrainian famine-genocide. The national anthems and songs of remembrance were sung by students from St. Martin Ukrainian Bilingual School.

November 20, the annual Holodomor-Genocide Commemoration in Edmonton was held near the first Holodomor-Genocide monument in the world at Edmonton City Hall, and was organized by the members of the UCC-Edmonton Branch.

On November 27 the annual commemoration in Calgary was organized by the UCC Calgary Branch, and took place near the memorial in their city.

Engaging Youth and Newcomers

Working with youth in our community and providing them with learning and leadership opportunities is another of UCC APC's key priorities. Engaging them in community projects, providing opportunities to be on our committees and take on public roles are some of the approaches we have implemented.

In 2010 the Ukrainian Student Society at the University of Alberta and the National Youth Advisory Council were welcomed to the UCC-APC as affiliate organizations. Their representatives regularly attend the Board meetings and continue to contribute to the Ukrainian community of Alberta. As well as ensure that we plan our activities in such a way as to attract youth participation.

This past summer two very talented University of Alberta students, Amy Yaremco and Adrian Warchola, worked at the UCC-APC office and did exemplary work.

Newcomers from Ukraine: On February 8, 2011 the UCC-APC President brought greetings on behalf of our organization to newcomers from Ukraine and to Ukrainian Canadian Social Services and its dedicated staff and volunteers. This volunteer appreciation event and introduction of recently arrived Ukrainian families settling in Edmonton is organized by UCSS and is always special as we welcome individuals and families not only to the city and the province but to our Ukrainian community. In addition, newcomers regularly stop by the UCC-APC office to get information about the organized Ukrainian community in Alberta.

Communications

The UCC-APC website has been re-designed, updated regularly, and we continue to have lots of activity with our on-line Alberta Ukrainian Community Events Calendar. Our Ukrainian Day and Holodomor web-pages are also popular and our website regularly attracts over 10,000 visitors per month. In addition, the UCC-APC e-bulletin initiated in 2009 has become a very popular and important source of news, event information, organizational announcements and overall Ukrainian Canadian community updates. UCC National and the Ukrainian World Congress also use our e-Bulletin as an additional channel to share news from our community across Canada. The distribution list continues to grow for this bi-monthly bulletin, having more than tripled in 2 years, providing a strong network of contacts in Alberta.

Three printed UCC-APC Newsletters were prepared and mailed to organizations, donors and supporters in Alberta as well. The UCC-APC Facebook page has been maintained, where we have more than 200 friends, primarily youth.

We continue to focus on attracting even more subscribers to our publications and e-news bulletin as well as promote our organization and community by having displays at events such as the Heritage Day Festival, Vegreville Pysanka Festival, Ukrainian Day Festival, and Hetman Awards. In addition to our office generated media, this past year articles about UCC-APC events and activities were published by the Ukrainian News, Homin Ukrainy, Ukrainian Weekly, and the Edmonton Journal.

November 2011. UCC Edmonton laid wreaths at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier during Remembrance Day, November 11; and also during the commemoration of the Holodomor, at City Hall the last Saturday in November. Our speaker at the 2011 commemoration of the Famine/Genocide - Holodomor was Boris Radyo, Assistant Superintendent of the Edmonton Catholic Schools. This event is a yearly event and is very well attended by our clergy and by organizations.

March 2012 - Shevchenko month and the Ukrainian Music Society of Alberta jointly with the UCC Edmonton branch sponsors the annual Shevchenko concert. Help is always received from members of the Ukrainian Youth Complex for their assistance with arranging of chairs and the sound system.

May 2012. Zeleni Sviata (Pentecost). A wreath is laid every year at this time at the monument in St. Michael's cemetery honouring those that gave up their lives for freedom, for Ukraine.

August 2012, UCC Edmonton coordinates the annual Ukraine's Independence Day and BBQ celebrations which take place yearly at the Ukrainian Youth Unity Complex. The guest speaker for the 2012 Ukraine Independence was Dr. Roman Petryshyn, URDC. Also in August, members of UCC Edmonton assist in the yearly celebrations of Ukrainian Day at the Village.

UCC Edmonton falls under the umbrella of UCC-APC, pays its membership to this body and therefore we have a responsibility to uphold the work of APC and to assist in whatever manner is possible or when we are called upon to do so. Representatives attend their monthly meetings to listen and to learn. (Events such as Ukrainian Day in the Village, Hetman Awards, etc.). Any planning sessions as organized by APC are attended by UCC Edmonton; the APC is our path to political/government offices, to take our concerns forward.

Throughout the course of the year there are events that are attended by UCC Edmonton, such as National Black Ribbon Day, Bishop's Appeal Dinner, Bishop's Prayer Breakfast, annual events of member organizations and annual meetings of member organizations, when invited. The future looks promising. A new Executive will be chosen at the annual meeting and an application has been received from an organization to join UCC Edmonton.

The Ukrainian Canadian Benevolent Society of Edmonton is our fund raising arm and members of UCC Edmonton are active on that board to review, discuss and approve requests for financial assistance. - For the last three years the Calgary Branch of UCC has displayed the LUC Holodomor Display and the Kyiv Students Art at Calgary's City Hall during Holodomor Awareness Week, set up by Marusia Shysh, funded by CYM Calgary and Calgary's UCC President Mykhailo Ilnycky. On the fourth Saturday of November at 11 am the cities 3 parishes and organizations commemorate the Holodomor and bring wreaths to St. Vladimir's Ukrainian Orthodox Cultural Centre just one block away from the Holodomor Monument on Memorial Drive along the Bow River in downtown Calgary. After the commemoration the wreaths are taken to the monument where they stay from year to year.
- Last year Calgary enjoyed visitors from Ukraine including the Junior Luge Team who participated in the World Cup Championship the last two weeks of November at Calgary Olympic Park.
- During this time on November 29th, Roman Krutsyk, Chairman of the Kyiv City Chapter of the All-Ukrainian Memorial Society presented his recent exhibition the Insurgency Movements in Soviet Ukraine, 1918-1933 which the youth from the Luge Team benefitted from staying at the Ukrainian Youth Centre, CYM Domivka.
- On the first Sunday of December Calgary's three Ukrainian Parishes, their choirs and various musical ensembles and soloists join together and start the Christmas seasons as one Ukrainian family. The Festival is sponsored by UCC Calgary, funded by UCPBA of Calgary and filmed by Echoes of Ukraine TV. In 2012 the event was hosted by St. Vladimir's Ukrainian Orthodox Congregation in their Cultural Centre and alternates with the Assumption Parish and St. Stephen Protomartyr Ukrainian Catholic Churches.
- During the month of March the Taras Shevchenko Concert organized by the Calgary Branch of UCC has had surprise visits from members outside the city including everyone from Vasyl Popaduke to Stefko Bandera. This year's special guest was Tatiana Onyshchenko, soloist from the Vervovka National Academic Folk Chorus who performed with such passion, /Reve ta Stohne moving the audience emotionally, feeling for a moment that we were in Ukraine on the hill above the Dnipro River looking down from the monument to Taras Shevchenko in Kaniv. Kalgarski Kobzari who took bandura lessons from Dr. Andriy Hornjatkevych and Iryna Tarnaws'ka at CYM Camp/St. Basil's Villa debuted Dumy Moyee to a standing ovation.
- The highlight of our year was the visit of His Beatitude Patriarch Sviatoslav of the Ukrainian Catholic Church for the celebration of 100 Years of Ukrainian Catholic Faith in Calgary. After visiting both parishes His Beatitude was able to attend the final show of the Calgary Ukrainian Festival Sunday evening. He was most impressed with the youth who performed at another successful festival. Pictured below is Svitank Girls Ensemble and the Tryzub Ukrainian Dance Ensemble who performed for the first time on a lawn with the Rocky Mountains as a backdrop at the home of the Groch Family, Thursday June 1.
- Before leaving the Calgary area His Beatitude and clergy from Calgary and Edmonton, Dr. Lubomyr Luciuk, UCCLA and Andriy Hladyshevsky of the Shevchenko Foundation visited the Internment Site of Ukrainians during WWI and the historical display at the Cave and Basin in Banff.

Ukrainian Canadian Archives and Museum of Alberta (UCAMA)

Honours: On 3 November 2011 UCAMA received a Recognition Award at the 37th annual Edmonton Historical Board Recognition Awards and Plaques Presentation at the Prince of Wales Armouries Heritage Centre. The award recognized UCAMA's dedicated service to the history of Alberta and the Ukrainian community.

City funding and construction re-commencement: On 16 November 2011 Edmonton's Executive Council voted unanimously to reaffirm the City's \$3 million commitment to UCAMA's new museum project. This decision paved the way for full-scale construction to commence in December 2011 and there have been no stoppages or delays in construction since that time.

Step Up to the Plate: With the release of the 2011 UCAMA newsletter in December 2011, the Step Up to the Plate donor recognition program was launched. Donors receive glass plates that feature the whimsical style of Iryna Karpenko. Three categories of these beautiful mixed media masterpieces are available: bronze for donations of \$500 or more, copper for donations of \$1000 or more and gold for donations of \$1,500 or more in one year.

Fundraising professional: In March 2012, UCAMA named Adam Zawadiuk as its Director of Fund Development. Adam has been meeting with business owners, corporate representatives and private individuals to promote UCAMA's building project. Adam is overseeing the Step Up to the Plate program, as well as aspects of advertising and grant writing for UCAMA.

Sod turning ceremony: To build on the momentum of construction, UCAMA held a sod breaking ceremony on 26 June 2012 at the site of the future museum on Jasper Avenue. Mayor Mandel, heads of the Federal and Provincial governments and Bishops of the Ukrainian Catholic and Ukrainian Orthodox churches spoke at the event. Several major donors were present and the event was well attended. Servus Credit Union presented UCAMA with a cheque for \$100,000.

Shevchenko Foundation grant: Thanks in part to a \$3000 grant from the Shevchenko Foundation, UCAMA was able to digitize almost 3,000 pages of its voluminous newspaper collection. The publications chosen were older Canadian newspapers in poorer condition that are not held by any other Canadian university library, making their preservation immensely imperative.

Professional standing: UCAMA continues to maintain Recognized Museum status within the Alberta Museums Association (AMA). This designation recognizes that UCAMA meets recognized museum standards and allows UCAMA to compete for AMA grants on a first consideration basis. UCAMA also maintains membership in the Archives Society of Alberta, the Canadian Museums Association, and the Canadian Heritage Information Network (CHIN).

Ukrainian Canadian Social Services (UCSS)

During the reported period UCSS has continued to provide its services to the community. Our office has been opened to the public and served needy community members that required help not available at main stream organizations. UCSS regular hours of operation were Monday to Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The office was operating on a walk-in basis but also by appointments. If there was a need, weekend or after hour appointments were available. Most services were free of charge and delivered in several languages. The office staff consisted of two full-time employees and one part-time: Coordinator of Community Services, Settlement and Volunteer Worker and Community Outreach Worker. The office staff worked under the management and directions of the Board of Directors.

UCSS of Edmonton has continued to provide its regular community services, like tax benefit applications, residency status changes, employment insurance applications, help with social security benefits, furnitue pick ups, translation & interpretation services, and volunteer coordination.

The office continued to work on immigration and settlement programs and dealt mostly with temporary foreign workers and their families that have already been in Canada for several years. The majority were nominated by the Province and applied for permanent residency mostly through the Embassy of Canada in the USA. UCSS hired an outreach community worker on a part-time basis that was funded by the Government of Alberta, the Spirit Grant. The worker searched for information on community senior centers and services available for seniors, and created a database. The Needs Assessment Questionnaire was prepared in English and Ukrainian, and distributed to seniors through Churches and other community organizations. The purpose of the questionnaire was to collect data on seniors' needs. Up to today about 70 questionnaires were returned to the office. After summarizing them, a data on the community senior needs will be compiled and will be used for future program planning.

The Pomich Ukraini Fund was established by UCSS, National in 1975 and its primary goal is to assist Ukrainians in need wherever they may be around the world. The "Pomich Ukraini Regulations" adopted at the last Convention is the main document for all UCSS branches with regards to providing any aid abroad. UCSS National has a signed agreement with Social Service of Ukraine and it covers all humanitarian aid that the Ukrainian Canadian Social Services Inc. provides in Ukraine. UCSS Edmonton assisted by contributing \$1000 to "Soup Kitchens" in Ukraine, and shipped school accessories collected by Delwood school to Social Service of Ukraine, Ternopil Branch to be distributed to needy children.

Our Annual Appreciation Night at Ukrainian Youth Unity Complex on February 5, 2011 was very successful and, like before, it was a great opportunity to thank the volunteers, welcome and introduce to the community 35 new Canadian families and individuals. Our Branch is a part of UCSS Inc. of Canada and during last year we continued to take part in its activities. The Headquarters conducted 3 teleconferences that have been designed to overview ongoing activities of UCSS branches (8 Branches) and Head Office's operation. In May 2011 two delegates – Ivanna Szewczuk and Oksana Ensslen attended triennial Convention of Ukrainian Canadian Social Services in Toronto.

On behalf of the office staff I would like to express our thank you to the Board of Directors and the community for support, generosity, understanding of the community needs, and all the work and time devoted to Ukrainian Canadian Social Services.

URDC Works Closely with Community

It is a policy of the Ukrainian Resource and Development Centre (URDC) at Grant MacEwan University to be engaged in and aware of the activities of the Ukrainian Canadian community.

This was evident over the past year by URDC's involving visitors from Ukraine in community events , co-sponsoring applied research on community topics, having the director of URDC speak at community events, and URDC co-sponsoring talks organized for the public.

URDC and its partners at Grant MacEwan University hosted three Ukrainian graduate students from Ukraine . Nadiya Drofyak came from Lviv to share experiences with the English as a Second Language department at MacEwan. Oksana Federenko and Iryna Hudym, visiting from from Kyiv's Institute of Special Education , visit community organizations to compare Edmonton's programs for deaf students and blind students to those in Ukraine.

During this past year, partially in preparation for the 125th anniversary celebrations of Ukrainian settlement in Canada in 2017, URDC at MacEwan University and the Kule Centre for Ukrainian and Canadian Folklore sponsored an update study about Ukrainian dance groups in Alberta.

In August, URDC director, Dr. Roman Petryshyn, was the keynote speaker to Edmonton's Ukrainian community on the occasion of the 21 Independence Day of Ukraine. On November 6, URDC and the David Peikoff Chair at Western Canadian Centre for Deaf Studies sponsored a public talk by Linda Cundy of Edmonton Public Schools. Linda spoke about her two week journey in Ukraine promoting the Canadian practice of bilingual education delivered in Sign Language and spoken Ukrainian.

In all of these cases URDC continues to be an active member of the UCC-APC and involved in the community.

Since our Society became a new member of UCC-APC, I would like to provide a bit of background about our organization, as to why we exist and what our role is.

Our Mission Statement (our mandate):

The Society exists to promote, advocate and support the Ukrainian Bilingual Program so as to sustain the highest quality of academic, bilingual, cultural and religious learning opportunities and resources for all students

Key Goals of the UBPAS for the Edmonton Catholic Schools Ukrainian Bilingual Program:

1. Achieving academic excellence and highly valued linguistic, cultural and religious learning experiences.
2. Proactive leadership in supporting, promoting the Ukrainian Bilingual Program and fairly representing the needs of participants.

The Edmonton Catholic Schools Ukrainian Bilingual Parent Advisory Society is a non-profit organization, operated by a Board of Directors who are parent volunteers. Our organization has been in existence almost since the beginning of the Ukrainian Bilingual Program (1974) with Edmonton Catholic Schools and became incorporated as a Society in 1982. The Society supports the Edmonton Catholic Schools Ukrainian Bilingual Program from Kindergarten to Grade 6 at St. Martin and St. Matthew elementary schools; Grade 7 to 9 at St. Kevin and Grade 10 to 12 at Austin O'Brien.

Our organization has been an active supporter of the Ukrainian Bilingual Program for almost 37 years. We work very closely with the schools and the School Board to meet the needs of the students in the Ukrainian Bilingual Program and to provide financial support for cultural projects, classroom/library resources, field trips, transportation costs, etc. We are a major stakeholder of the Ukrainian Bilingual Program.

For promotion and advertising for the UBP, we work closely with the Edmonton Catholic School District and its Marketing/Communication department to develop and implement a marketing plan.

The marketing plan for 2012-13 included retail media ads (self check out and Ad bars) at several Safeway and Sobeys throughout the city; Airport Scrolling display (will run for 1 year March 01, 2012 to March 01, 2013); newspaper ads (Examiner, ACUA, Ukrainian News) and Radio Ads (UP 99.3 and JOE FM).

Ukrainian Bilingual Language Association UBLA is a non-profit, registered society created in 1975 to support the Ukrainian International Bilingual Program within the Edmonton Public School System. The main objective is to:

“Promote the learning of Ukrainian language and culture adhering to EPSB’s, “Second Language--Program of Studies”, supporting students, teachers, and parents to attain their common goal”.

Any parent with a child in the Ukrainian International Bilingual Program is considered a member of UBLA.

UBLA financially supports many cultural events, field trips and special projects throughout the year such as Ukrainian dance performances, and in house artists who teach wheat weaving & traditional snitcher.

Our children are fortunate to have such exposure to our rich cultural heritage through Edmonton Public Schools, experiencing such activities as Sviaty Mykolai, Sviata Vechirya & Ukrainian Easter traditions. UBLA also funds all awards & gifts, with the exception of the Servus Credit Union Scholarship, from at Gr. 6 through to Gr. 12.

Financial sustainability is through donations of various community organizations and volunteer fundraising, performed by the membership of UBLA such as Casinos, and Bingos.

A YEAR IN REVIEW-September 2011-June 2012:

We began the year with a record breaking General Meeting attendance and full executive. The full executive had an absolutely positive impact on workload being lightened and accomplishing more.

A new brochure was created speaking to changes within the program, updating and revitalizing what our program was about.

In a continued effort to raise awareness of our program, focusing on enrolment increases, we participated in the Mom’s Pop’s and Tot’s Fair held at Northland’s, where our students performed showcasing our new Bandura club and choir. A large focal point was our students walking around in their Ukrainian attire putting on our new tattoos promoting our program. We advertised in the Shumka Handbill for their March performance, a hockey program, the ACUA VITAE 25th anniversary edition, & the Vegreville Pysanka Program. We also displayed our banner again at the Vegreville main stage for the Grand Stand Show. The tradeshow display was at the Ukrainian Village for Festival of Dance, and we advertised in the booklet for the Ukrainian Day Festivities in August. We also renewed our LRT train car ad, which included interior cards being displayed throughout all the cars. Our LRT ad brought attention to CBC Radio reporter, Mark Harvey, who did a story on our program and parent executive. The main point of the story was, “How can our enrolments be so low when the phonebook is full of Ukrainians?” Something’s wrong with this picture..... I received many comments about the story, stating, “way to fight for us Ukrainians” and “you said it like it is”. We also had T-Shirts made up as gifts for our students, but more so as a promotion advertising our program. Nothing better than kids advertising kids programs!

Our partnership with our Marketing Consultant, Julianna Veldtman, of Whitebox Communications was continued last year. Her contract last year consisted of the new brochure, setting us up for the Mom’s Pop’s & Tot’s Fair and a 2 year Marketing Plan, which is currently being worked on. We were advised in February the EPSB would no longer be supporting parent committee Design Graphics. This will be a primary focus on getting someone to manage this, which would enable UBLA to run ads using our new brochure format.

We continued to strengthen our communications and partnership with the Ukrainian Canadian Congress, (aka KYK) which includes the subcommittee of Ukrainian Language Consortium. I was asked to attend a meeting of the congress, with the Board of Directors, to speak to why we think they could help us and how we could help them.
